
Dr. Richard Haass, a veteran diplomat and respected scholar of international relations, is President Emeritus of the Council on Foreign Relations and is a Senior Counselor with Centerview Partners, an international investment banking advisory firm. As CFR's president for 20 years, he served in the State Department

under Presidents George W. Bush and Ronald Reagan, at the White House under George H.W. Bush, and at the Pentagon under Jimmy Carter. He was U.S. envoy to the Cyprus negotiations and the Northern Ireland peace process, and after 9/11 was U.S. coordinator for the future of Afghanistan. A Rhodes Scholar, Haass holds a bachelor's degree from Oberlin College, the masters and doctorate of philosophy degrees from Oxford University, and numerous honorary degrees. He is the recipient of the State Department's Superior Honor Award, the Presidential Citizens

Medal, and the Tipperary International Peace Award.

Haass, who was born in Brooklyn and grew up on Long Island, lives with his wife in New York City. He authors a weekly newsletter, *Home & Away*, available on Substack.

His latest book, *The Bill of Obligations: The Ten Habits of Good Citizens*, was published by Penguin Press in January 2023 and became a *New York Times* bestseller.



# Carl M. Buchholz MEMORIAL LECTURE



The Carl M. Buchholz Memorial Lecture has been established through the generosity of the friends, colleagues, and family of the late Carl M. Buchholz. Carl served as vice chair of the Board of the Museum of the American Revolution from 2008 until his untimely death in 2016.

The Carl M. Buchholz Memorial Lecture series explores the political thought of the American Revolution and focuses on its national relevance today.

A graduate of The University of Virginia, frequently referred to as "Mr. Jefferson's University," Carl admired Thomas Jefferson's seminal role in establishing concepts of individual rights and equality as the foundations of America's great experiment in constitutional democracy. Carl received his law degree from the University of Pennsylvania, and his public service included being Special Assistant to U.S. Senator John Heinz and Special Assistant to President George W. Bush, helping to create the U.S. Department of Homeland Security. He was the managing partner of the Philadelphia office of DLA Piper at the time of his passing.

Carl viewed the Museum as a critically needed educational institution, important for its role in preserving and teaching the origin and relevance of the inspiring ideas of the American Revolution.

The Carl M. Buchholz Memorial Lecture honors Carl's interests and sustains the memory of his life and achievements.
